The Posada 2020



What is a Posada? A Posada is an old Mexican tradition where young people dressed as Mary and Joseph would travel from house to house telling people in the weeks leading up to Christmas about the imminent arrival of Jesus. On Christmas Eve they would visit the local church to re-enact the nativity and place figures of Mary and Joseph in a crib. The word 'Posada' means 'Inn' in Spanish.



Today in this country, the Posada is often a shoe box with crafted or knitted figures of Mary, Joseph, and the donkey. The Posada is passed from house to house each day during Advent where it is given hospitality for the night. These 'guests' need no food or drink!

The posada reminds us of the journey that Mary and Joseph take Nazareth to Bethlehem while Mary is with child. Sadly, this year we are unable to pass the Posada shoe box with Mary, Joseph and the donkey from house to house.

So this year we are doing something different!

We are sending out Mary, Joseph, and the Donkey as templates to be coloured in - using crayons, paint or collage material and then cut out. Then we are asking you to place them in a front window for everyone to see.



Hopefully, we will be able to see a growing number of houses displaying Mary, Joseph, and the donkey as if we see them travelling around the village.

Please do enlarge the cut-outs, if you would like to, and make a larger display. If you wish, please do send the Benefice Office a photo of your cut-outs displayed in the window and we'll load them up onto the church website and Facebook page. Please look out for Mary and Joseph as you walk around the village.

Then on Christmas Eve, you could use the other characters in the pack to make the story of Jesus' birth and display them on the coloured in background.

...... The story of Jesus' birth
